# **Residential Recycling Collection Information**

Baltimore County's single stream recycling program allows residents to set out more materials for recycling collection and also offers new ways to set out these recyclables.

### What Can Be Collected

Caps, labels, lids, and rings are OK for collection!

\*Note: milk and juice cartons/boxes are NOT covered with wax or plastic; different manufacturers have different techniques for achieving the polished look on the exterior.

## **How To Set Out Materials**



• Recyclables may be mixed together and set out for recycling collection in a variety of containers, including:

- o sturdy outdoor recycling containers up to 34 gallon capacity;
- o sturdy outdoor trash containers up to 34 gallon capacity, for recycling use only (marked with a large "X" or "RECYCLE"); or
- o small cardboard boxes (boxes collected with contents).
- Paper and cardboard may also be tied in bundles with non-plastic string or placed in paper bags for collection.
- Containers are limited to a maximum filled weight of 40 pounds. Boxes, bags, and bundles are limited to a maximum filled weight of 30 pounds.
- If the container has a lid, the lid must not be fastened to the container with rope, wire, chains, etc.
- Containers with hinged lids and/or wheels are not recommended (due to difficulty in handling by collectors, and the lids/wheels being prone to breakage).

Baltimore County has made stickers available for residents that may be affixed to containers as another way to designate that the containers are being used exclusively for recycling. These stickers are not in any way required to participate in the single stream recycling program. Stickers for recycling containers are available free of charge at the following locations: Baltimore County senior centers, Baltimore County public libraries, and the County's three <u>trash and recycling drop-off centers</u> in White Marsh, Cockeysville, and Halethorpe. We encourage residents to call ahead to a library or senior center before visiting to ensure that they have a supply of container stickers.

Recyclables must not be set out for recycling collection in plastic bags of any type or color (plastic bags will not be collected in order to prevent processing complications at the "single stream" recycling sorting facility).

Though plastic bags will not be permitted in Baltimore County's single stream program, many local grocery stores will accept clean, dry plastic bags for recycling. You can help the environment even more by using reusable bags when shopping. This will eliminate or reduce your need for plastic bags.
